

819th RED HORSE FROM MALMSTROM TRAVEL TO PHILIPPINES FOR TRAINING.

BASA AIR BASE, PHILIPPINES: Airmen from the 819th RED HORSE Squadron out of Malmstrom Air Force Base, Montana, traveled to the Philippines to work alongside their Philippine Air Force counterparts in a Field Training Event, Jan. 23 through Feb. 3.

The training event allowed both units to exchange knowledge and best practices in pouring a concrete pad which will be used as a future training site for airfield damage repair, or ADR.

"We were able to work together as a bi-lateral team to train on these capabilities for future ADR exercises and open up more doors in the future for the Indo-Pacific as a whole," said U.S. Air Force Capt. James Hammons, 819th RED HORSE Squadron job site officer in charge. "Building partnerships is incredibly important, especially in this region. The PAF works very hard, so it was remarkable to be part of the team over the last couple weeks and see us all turn out a really great product."

This event was one of many that took place in the Philippines over the course of two weeks, to include subject matter expert exchanges on maintenance, hot pit refueling, airfield damage repair, and logistics.

"The U.S. Air Force team is easy to socialize with and very open in learning," said Philippine Air Force 2nd Lt. Peter Daryl Isnit, job site officer in charge for the PAF. "This is why personnel from our team took the pleasure in teaching them.


We tried to work alongside every member of each team using the buddy-system in groups to explain and share our way of construction. Through this, we had the opportunity to talk about the advantages and disadvantages of our methods and compare and adjust processes as a team. We also got to know what life is [like] on the other side of the world and share with them how good our food is and about the people in our country."

They shared special moments with each other, including promotions, birthdays, culture, cuisine, and language. "This was much more than a job," said Gibson at a dinner, celebrating finishing the mission. "This was building a brotherhood. The Philippine Airmen took us in and taught us so much about their culture. We will be forever grateful for this entire experience. It's one that I don't think any one of us will ever forget."

The two teams poured roughly 220 cubic yards of concrete over the course of their time together, learning how each crew operates and improving procedures a little at a time.

"As a whole, the process over the last few days has gotten much better and quicker," said U.S. Air Force Tech. Sgt. Kyle Gibson, 819th RED HORSE Squadron job site noncommissioned officer in charge.



"We learned how they wanted things done so the set up kept getting quicker, expediting the process. By the end of our time, we were working seamlessly as a whole, integrated team."

U.S. AIR FORCE, ARMY ENGINEERS PRIORITIZE INTEROPERABILITY TO SET INDOPACOM THEATER

MALMSTROM AIR FORCE BASE, MT: MA recent announcement by Defense Secretary Lloyd Austin regarding the strengthening alliances in the Indo-Pacific between the United States and the Philippines has made one thing clear: unity and a combined, all-domain effort could be the difference in winning large-scale, multidomain battles the U.S. expects to fight in the future.

Interoperability is no longer a nice-to-have but a need-to-have; this includes collaboration between U.S. sister services to build the Indo-Pacific theater at a moment's notice.

In line with Austin's announcement, the 819th RHS recently hosted U.S. Army Col. Jeffrey Hall, 555th Engineer Brigade commander, for an immersive tour of their facilities and mission brief on Malmstrom Air Force Base, Montana, February 2, 2023.

RED HORSE Airmen are known for being the most ready and preeminent heavy construction unit in the Department of Defense; adept at setting the theater with built-in infrastructure weapons systems without support and at a moment's notice.

The 819th RHS and 555th Engineer Brigade have been partners for five years with the common goal of building competence and confidence with worldwide construction opportunities.

Though it was Hall's first time visiting the constructionfocused enablers here, he was not new to the longstanding relationship between the two units.

According to him, the U.S. Army is looking at improving airfield operations joint training to enhance performance in a contested environment.

The 555th Engineer Brigade and 819th RHS employ a service engineer personnel exchange program in which two Soldiers are stationed here and one Airman is stationed at Joint Base Lewis-McChord, Washington, to enhance mission understanding and build upon the foundation required for allied capacity.

"Our mission now is to set the theater," Delorit explained during his mission brief. "[Our work in] Tinian Island is proof-of-concept that we can deploy like we say we can and be self-sufficient."

The Department of Defense signed an initiative in 2019 to build an alternate operations facility on Tinian which would serve as a divert airfield in the Western Pacific; the 819th RHS has contributed in the form of site assessment teams and engineer support for program management.



"The 819th RHS continues to train and equip to meet the demands of the Pacific Theatre," said Chief Master Sgt. Nathan Laidlaw, 819th RHS senior enlisted leader. "Department of Defense-wide partnerships create opportunities to innovate and excel as a joint team."

This prioritization runs parallel to the expedient nature in which the U.S. is advancing military presence in the Indo-Pacific region to stand against threats from China and North Korea.

RED HORSE units are self-sufficient and capable of rapid response and independent operations in remote, high-threat environments worldwide. They provide heavy-repair capability and construction support when requirements exceed normal base civil engineer capabilities and where U.S. Army engineer support is not readily available.

202nd RED HORSE MODERNIZE AIRFIELD AT NAVAL AIR STATION.

JACKSONVILLE, FL AIR NATIONAL GUARD: Airmen of the 202nd RED HORSE Squadron are modernizing the airfield ramp at Naval Air Station Jacksonville to ensure taxiway concrete can withstand the weight of the U.S. Navy's P-8A Poseidon aircraft.

The airfield, in its current condition, will significantly decay under the weight of the 138,000-pound aircraft which is flown by seven squadrons belonging to the Commander, Patrol and Reconnaissance Wing Eleven at NAS Jacksonville.

Airmen broke ground January 30 and removed about eight tons of concrete in preparation for the use of high-density concrete, known as 650 Flex Concrete. The concrete mixture is made for high-capacity reserve load-carrying and has greater resistance to degradation by fuel spillage, oil drippings, jet health and blast, said Master Sgt. Timothy Jackson, 202nd RED HORSE project manager.

The team, comprised of 202nd RHS airfield pavement and construction engineers, are replacing four areas of existing 12 by 15 square feet concrete slabs on the airfield ramp. The new slabs are approximately 12 by 15 square feet and 15-inches thick but use 5,000 pounds-per-square-inch (PSI) concrete which allows the slabs to support the weight of the new P-8 aircraft which are heavier than their predecessors.

"We're here to deliver the Navy a good product," said Jackson. "It's heavy construction but on a lower scale for the tempo so we're able to get some training done as well. It's a win-win for both parties."

Airmen of the 202nd RHS train annually to remain ready for these types of engineering and construction projects. The units are designed to provide the Air Force with a highly mobile and rapidly deployable civil engineering response force capable of independently responding to contingency and special operations in remote, high-threat environments worldwide. The airfield repairs are scheduled to conclude by the end of February 2023.

MEDICAL RESEARCHER WHOSE NAME IS KRISTY RED HORSE.

SHE STUDIES GROWING ARTERIES TO AID HEART ATTACK RECOVERY: Kristy Red Horse, a researcher in regenerative medicine at Stanford University and the Howard Hughes Medical Institute (HHMI), studies the growth of the arteries that supply the heart with blood and oxygen.



Regenerative medicine researcher Kristy Red Horse's discoveries may someday help damaged hearts heal better. Her stewardship of her Native American heritage may advance science in other ways too.

Red Horse is an associate professor of biology at Stanford University and a member of the school's Institute for Stem Cell Biology and Regenerative Medicine, and has become a leader in the pursuit of that understanding. She has published groundbreaking studies on the origins of blood vessels in the hearts of mammals. The hope is that what she and her colleagues have learned about the growth of those vessels during fetal development could help rescue the heart after a heart attack.

Red Horse thinks it might be a couple of decades before her area of research yields a regenerative therapy for heart attacks. But she doesn't mind being patient because the scientific process itself is rewarding. "You get to be a detective and an artist," she said.



55th CIVIL ENGINEERING SQUADRON: 2022 RUNWAY COMPLETION AT OFFUTT AFB.

OFFUTT AFB, NE: Today, we spotlight the 55 CES, the 2022 runway completion at Offutt AFB, and Rob Hufford, Chief of Construction Management, who was among the first to take flight from Lincoln, Nebraska, to the final landing at Offutt AFB. The runway project was completed in 579 days and was on time and within budget in. The effort included all hands-on deck, with 209,000 people making 19,000 roundtrips to support over 1,800 sorties out of Lincoln. The project was no small effort, with over 25 million pounds of equipment being moved and close to 240,000 hours of security force defenders protecting the space during construction.



This AFB was established in 1939 and renamed in 1941 to honor an aviator who served in World War I. Situated on 5,767 acres, this AFB houses 19 aircrafts, worth \$1B, and is home to the Hurricane Hunters.

TYNDAL AIR FORCE BASE REBUILD ARTICLES: 801st, Det 1, RED HORSE TRANING SQUADRON STANDS UP OPERATING LOCATION AT NELLIS AFB.

NELLIS AIR FORCE BASE, NV: Following the stand-up of the 801st, Det 1, Rapid Engineer Deployable, Heavy Operational Repair Squadron Engineers Training Squadron at Tyndall AFB earlier this year, an additional geographically separated unit activated Nov. 21 at Nellis Air Force Base, Nevada.

The 801st, Det 1, RHTS was designed to stabilize, standardize and cultivate contingency training for combat support teams across the Air Force, allowing instructors to focus on training members. Special Capabilities flight, originally under the 820th RED HORSE, was realigned as the 801st, Det 1, RHTS Operating Location-A to best execute the existing mission.

"[The Special Capabilities flight] is made up of instructors operating under the 820th [RED HORSE] which is focused on deployments and executing projects," said Capt. Victoria LaFemina, 801st, Det 1, Operating Location – a flight commander. "The 801st, Det 1, Operating Location will give leadership an opportunity to invest in our instructors to ensure they are trained not only on how to be an instructor and teach, but also to make them the leading experts in whatever course they're teaching."

Performing a training mission under an operational squadron poses several complications. Reorganizing the command structure to place the Special Capabilities flight under the 801st, Det 1, RHTS will provide instructors with the stability and resources necessary to provide critical training without having to worry about also completing a deployable mission.

"Before, we would have to keep rotating instructors, so we could teach for so long but eventually [due to a deployment, TDY or other priorities] we would be rotated out," said Staff Sgt. Emanual Lopez, 801st, Det 1, OL-A instructor. "Now with us being coded under the operating location, we aren't eligible for deployments which allows us to get our knowledge up and become the true subject matter experts on material that we're teaching."

Lt. Col. Craig Poulin, 801st, Det 1, RHTS commander, explained that RED HORSE is unique because they bring specialized capabilities to the fight to enable combat support and to build the infrastructure required in contingency environments.

"Being a RED HORSE instructor is also very special," said Poulin. "It takes confidence and competence in the ability to instruct others, both in the classroom and in the field.



That confidence and competence applies both to the students we teach, but also to the instructors we have within the organization."

The mission of the now 801st, Det 1, RHTS OL-A, will not change. The unit offers more than 70 courses a year including asphalt paving, explosive demolition operations and quarry operations to active duty, guard and reserve civil engineers. In fact, the location of the 801st, Det 1, OL-A is unique to Nellis due to the amount of space available to conduct explosive demolition operations and quarry operations.

The reorganization of the 801st, Det 1, RHTS OL-A will provide the instructors with the stability and support they need to reach their highest potential and foster a training environment that produces combat support Airmen.

TYNDALL AIR FORCE BASE, FL: 801st RED HORSE Training Squadron develops and delivers integrated, realistic training and exercises for combat support teams. The squadron operates the Silver Flag Exercise Site on Tyndall Air Force Base, FL., which is the Air Force's largest Agile Combat Support training location. The courses and readiness exercises executed by 801st, RHTS prepare Total Force Airmen for contingency operations and worldwide deployments. Functional communities currently supported consist of Civil Engineering, Contracting, Financial Management. Force Support. Transportation, and Manpower. The squadron trains more than 4,500 personnel each year.

SILVER FLAG TYNDALL (SF-T) is the largest readiness event executed by 801st RHTS. SF-T is integrated Agile Combat Support training exercise in which teams accomplish tasks necessary to establish, operate, and recover an airbase as part of an Expeditionary Airbase (XAB) Force Element or an associated Demand Force Team (DFT).

801st, Det 1, RHTS was activated on April 26, 2022. Prior to its activation, the unit was designated Detachment 1, 823rd RED HORSE Squadron, and it has operated at Tyndall Air Force Base since 1993. The unit's heritage extends back to the 1970s with its predecessor units executing Silver Flag at Eglin Air Force Base, FL. and Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, Ohio.

801st RHTS executes other readiness events including Runway Damage Repair and Emergency Airfield Lighting System training, the Expeditionary Manpower Management Course, Officer Field Experience for Civil Engineer initial skills training, and Civil Air Patrol encampments. In 2022, the squadron hosted Readiness Challenge VIII-a civil engineer contingency skills competition-and restored the event after a 22-year hiatus. 801st RHTS also hosts combat support teams for unit-requested training and access to the Silver Flag Exercise Site.

WHITEMAN AIR FORCE BASE, MO.: Some people argue whether it is better to eat prime beef rare or well done. However, the U.S. Air Force thinks it is best served as the Base Engineer Emergency Force, or as it is more frequently known Prime BEEF.

Prime BEEF is a specialized unit within certain Air Force Civil Engineering squadrons comprised of skilled construction technicians, earth movers, electricians, plumbers, firefighters, and explosive ordnance disposal Airmen. These units across the Air Force stand by to respond to and support contingency operations when needed.

The 509th Civil Engineering Squadron Prime BEEF section maintains readiness by training, certifying, and tracking its members, ensuring they are rapidly deployable and able to support relief efforts for man-made or natural disasters. Matthew Damaso, 509th CES unit deployment manager, said Prime BEEF's monthly training is contingency based. It includes vehicle training, land navigation, tactical movements, and other deployment-related training.

The Airmen attached to Prime BEEF must be knowledgeable with deployment skills and able to employ them anywhere in order to complete the tasks expected of them.

Prime BEEF teams frequently deploy to a location after another civil engineering team has already built up a bare base, a base with the minimum essential facilities to house, sustain, and support operations.



"Prime BEEF is your sustainment side of a base," said U.S. Air Force Tech. Sgt. Matthew Fenton, 509th CES prime BEEF manager. "After the bare base is built, our guys are out there. They are building defensive fighting positions with the Army side-by-side with our own security forces."

Prime BEEF units "BEEF" up bare bases by building additional infrastructure to support contingency operations more effectively.

"Once everything is said and done, the Airmen function as any other CE unit would," said Fenton. "You have your electricians, plumbers, firefighters and everything in between. Without that presence, the base would just not be able to function at its highest ability."

The 509th Prime BEEF Airmen affect more than just deployed locations.

Damaso said some of Prime BEEF's most important missions stateside are the bomber strategic aircraft recovery teams and bomber task forces.

"If they send out those types of teams, there is a select number of members who must go," he said. "That way they are able to build something up in a moment's notice."

That could mean getting a new base up and running quickly so that the Air Force can continue its mission if another main operating base were to be lost. Prime BEEF units might also repair infrastructure at deployed locations or assist with setting up emergency relief areas if an aircraft crashes.

When Prime BEEF Airmen take the words "from the ground up" to heart, they allow the Air Force to execute crucial and hazardous missions in austere environments. This enables the B-2 Spirit to perform nuclear operations and global strike, anytime, anywhere.

WOMEN'S HISTORY MONTH

COL (RET) SUSANNE WAYLETT

She was the first woman in the field of Civil Engineering, squadron commander, O6 select, RED HORSE commander, and group commander at the Air Force.



As a pioneer in civil engineering, retired Col Susanne Waylett paved the way for future generations of women. Navigating the Air Force through many changes over the span of 29 years, Waylett has a record to show for her extraordinary service.

Throughout her military career, retired Col Susanne Waylett experienced many firsts and broke through many barriers due to her hard work ethic and determination to "get the job done." Waylett was not only an exceptional officer rising through the ranks of the Air Force but a civil engineering pioneer setting the path for generations of women to follow.

Waylett's journey started from humble beginnings; her parents served in World War II and instilled in Waylett a deep understanding of patriotism and service. Waylett's mother was an aircraft mechanic in the Marine Corps and one of three sisters who served in the military. Her father served as a pilot in the Army Air Corps. As the oldest of eight kids, Waylett was raised as a leader.

Waylett's military career began in 1971 after graduating from the University of Michigan. At the time, few engineering jobs were available so Waylett explored options within the Air Force. After speaking with a recruiter, Waylett took the entrance exam and was accepted into the Air Force. It was a tumultuous time for women entering the Air Force in the early 1970s; the Vietnam War was at its height, and women could not serve in combat. "I had to wait until January 1971 for an opening spot at Officer Training School because of the war," Waylett explained.

Waylett was invited to Randolph Air Force Base to meet with the Air Force Civil Engineer at the midpoint of her officer training. This was an unusual invitation for an officer-candidate, but it was at that point Waylett learned she would be the first woman in the civil engineering career field. To her surprise, she was allowed to select her choice of assignment. For her first assignment, Waylett went with Kelly Air Force Base, Texas, which was a familiar environment due to Officer Training School.

During the first eight months at her first assignment, Waylett was invited to Washington, D.C., to meet high-rank officials in the Air Force and speak with local press members. She quickly realized that her time in the Air Force was turning into a publicity tour which was not the career she envisioned for herself when she signed up to serve her country. "I did not join the Air Force to be a poster child or do a campaign for recruiting," Waylett said. After having an opportunity to meet Maj Gen Jeanne Holm, who was the first woman general officer in the Air Force at that time, Waylett knew she could do whatever she set out to do.

Ambitious for more, Waylett was encouraged to seek a new opportunity, but this time on a more remote base outside the U.S. In 1972, she elected to go to Osan Air Base, Korea.



It was at Osan that she met one of her first mentors in the Air Force, MSgt Dennis Mcknight, who told her, "Lieutenant, you can take over and run this industrial engineering function, or I will. But if you do, I will teach you everything I know." Waylett took his words to heart and made a name for herself. While only one of forty women across the entire base, Waylett never allowed her gender to limit her abilities or disqualify her from any role.



As the first woman RED HORSE commander, she led a team to Bosnia in the early 1990s to assist with the construction of tent cities for the Army.

It was a highly challenging mission due to the aftermath of the war and the weather conditions. "We had mud up to our knees and slept in vehicles when we arrived," Waylett explained. In addition to the crumbling infrastructure, they also dealt with logistics problems. They had to fly materials from Ramstein Air Base, Germany, to Bosnia, which resulted in many delays. While the Army was the lead service in Bosnia, Waylett was tasked with coordinating because of her leadership capabilities.

Her next deployment was the rebuilding of Prince Sultan Air Base, Saudi Arabia, following the Khobar Tower bombing. Waylett was flown out to the base immediately after her team was requested. Only after arriving at Prince Sultan Air Base did Waylett discover that a woman had never occupied the Saudi Arabia base headquarters building. In light of the political nature of the situation, Waylett was prepared to take a backseat. However, the base commander insisted that she have the freedom to command her unit. Through each deployment, Waylett gained the respect of her peers and leadership, along with trust in herself to do the job right.

Each time Waylett transitioned into a new role or embarked on a new venture in her life, she received support and guidance from her civil engineer family. One of the toughest challenges Waylett faced was being a single parent in the military. "As a mom trying to balance between my career and motherhood, it made a huge difference what career field I was in, "Waylett said.

Waylett understood the implications of being a mother and an officer in the military as her decisions directly impacted her daughter. "There are always hard choices, but they are magnified when you are in the military. We are there to support and defend. We have to be ready to pay with our lives," she elaborated.

Through it all, Waylett is proud of the legacy she is leaving behind and the impact she has made on civil engineering. Among the many accomplishments Waylett has had throughout her career, one of her most memorable ones came just last year when she was awarded the AFIT Alumni Award. Waylett will continue her record of accomplishment at this year's Readiness Challenge in April with an award being named after her that will be presented to winners.



Waylett paved the way for other women in a traditionally maledominated career field and remains a proud figure in the civil engineering community to this day.

USAF SEEKS TO ALMOST DOUBLE FOREIGN INFRASTRUCTURE INVESTMENT IN '24

From Norway to Australia, from Guam to United Kingdom, the Air Force wants to invest more money in infrastructure outside the continental U.S. than it has in years, according to budget documents. As part of to its fiscal year 2024 budget request, the Air Force is seeking \$1.24 billion in appropriations and \$872.5 million in authorizations for military construction outside the U.S.—both of which are its largest requests since at least 2000.

AFCEC RUNWAY CONSTRUCTION AT LITTLE ROCK AFB NEAR FINAL PHASE

JOINT BASE SAN ANTONIO-LACKLAND, TEXAS: After over two years of construction, the Air Force Installation and Mission Support Center successfully completed a vital milestone of the extension of Little Rock Air Force Base's mission-critical runway in Arkansas recently.

The significant project milestone, spearheaded by the Air Force Civil Engineer Center, is part of a four-phased effort to fully replace the aging runway, built in 1955. The achievement, referred to as "Phase 3A," modernized the middle west end of the runway, adding 3,000 feet of new pavement to extend the operational section to 8,000 feet and re-opening Taxiway B.

Mission-ready airfields are essential to the lethality and readiness of our Air and Space Forces," said Col. George Nichols, deputy director at AFCEC's Facility Engineering Directorate. "The airfield is Little Rock's most important mission asset, and many thanks to our teams of engineering experts, we're delivering resilient infrastructure the installation needs for its mission assurance."

The AFCEC directorate is the Air Force's design and construction entity charged with delivering military construction programs that support Department of Defense priorities.

AFCEC is executing the \$180 million construction effort, providing design and planning, and ensuring the project stays on time and within budget alongside contracting partners in the Air Force Installation Contracting Center's 772nd Enterprising Sourcing Squadron.

The recent phase 3A milestone supports the training mission at Little Rock AFB and significantly bolsters the installation's flying mission by providing more flexibility for mission commanders, enabling more efficient and safe daily flight operations.

The Arkansas base is home to the 19th Airlift Wing and serves as the center of the C-130 enterprise. It hosts the world's largest C-130 training mission, providing agile combat airlift worldwide and training pilots and aircrew for all Department of Defense branches.

Additionally, the installation supports a variety of other missions and accommodates aircraft within Air Mobility Command's fleet including the C-5 Galaxy, KC-10 Extender, C-17 Globemaster III and KC-135 Stratotanker.

The AFCEC-led effort is one of the most extensive infrastructure repairs at the Arkansas base since its first opening.



"Over the years, certain sections of the runway were fixed and patched multiple times to ensure the airfield remains operational. However, the runway required a complete replacement," said Monica Escobar, AFCEC's project manager.

Modernization of Little Rock's airfield began in May 2020 when AFCEC, in collaboration with the installation's 19th Civil Engineer Squadron, AFICC and AFIMSC's Detachment 9, awarded the contract for the long-awaited upgrades.

Since then, much of the work is completed to include a new 4,000-foot assault landing zone, 10,000-foot construction on primary runway 07/25 and replacement of seven connecting taxiways.

After six years of closure, the reopening of the ALZ was a major addition to the installation's training capabilities, as the landing assault space helps pilots train for landings in austere locations with unfinished or shorter runways.

Work is currently underway to complete "Phase 3B" which involves finishing the remaining 2,000-foot of concrete paving on the main runway, 1,000-foot of asphalt paving on the overrun, rebuilding Taxiway A, in addition to extensive airfield electrical light fixture replacements and upgrades to navigational aids.

Weather conditions have caused major challenges for the project, Escobar said, but thanks to teamwork and effective planning early in the construction, the AFCEC team identified a path to merge projects into phase three, keeping delivery on time and within budget. The plan allowed contractors to work both the ALZ and west runway at the same time. It also included phases 3A and 3B at the same time vice sequentially.

AFCEC plans to wrap up the west runway section by July before transitioning to the final construction phase in the fall. Once all phases of construction are complete, the runway will be 12,000 feet long and 150 feet wide.

After a weeklong competition filled with full-spectrum, integrated base response and recovery operations events between eight teams from across the Department of the Air Force, 99th CES demonstrated they were the best.

It feels great! This was a complete team effort, because most of us didn't know each other when we started and yet here we are," said Tech. Sgt. John Seaton, 99th Civil Engineer Squadron. "There wasn't a single person who didn't want to be here, there was no weak link in our chain, and if you gave me enough time, I could list every single contribution from every single person and how they elevated us to first place."

Sponsored by Air Force Civil Engineer Center and executed by the 801st RED HORSE Training Squadron, Readiness Challenge is the capstone event for DAF civil engineers. For the first time in more than 20 years it was conducted at full operational capability with more challenges and new evaluations.

"What makes this Readiness Challenge unique is that teams got to practice their multi-capable Airman skills," said Master Sgt. Austin Henrichsen, operations director for Readiness Challenge and a member of the 801st RED HORSE Training Squadron. "Instead of breaking up the teams and having the Airmen compete in tasks related to their specialties, they completed the challenges as a team. This encouraged the Airmen to teach and learn from each other on their different skill sets and grow as a team; and no other challenge is going to do that."



More than 300 Airmen competed in this year's event, representing teams from the Air National Guard, Air Force Reserve Command, Air Education and Training Command, Air Force Global Strike Command, Air Force District of Washington, Air Combat Command, U.S. Air Forces in Europe and Air Forces Africa, and Pacific Air Forces.

Resembling a deployment model, the major command teams were made up of 41 Airmen with various civil engineer skills, including electrical, power production, HVAC, pavement and equipment, structures, water and fuels maintenance systems, pest management, engineering assistance, operations managers, fire fighters, explosive ordnance disposal, and emergency management technicians, along with a civil engineer officer.

"Readiness Challenge is the most realistic training our Airmen will get in preparation for combat operations," said Brig. Gen. William Kale, AFCEC commander. "With events like these, we're prioritizing Airman readiness, ensuring the Air and Space Force lethality." Readiness Challenge also allows AFCEC, civil engineer career field managers and leaders to assess unit readiness, find deficiencies and identify training opportunities.

"The event incentivizes and reinforces the training we develop for the career field here at AFCEC," said Senior Master Sgt. Robert Krumlinde, EOD force development manager at AFCEC. "With the help of the 801st RED HORSE we're able to deliver that training and then evaluate them here at Readiness Challenge, so it's a winwin for everyone."

Leaders say this year's FOC competition is the foundation for many more to come.

"Readiness Challenge has grown significantly since it first challenged civil engineers back in 1986," said Kale. "I expect each and every year, hereafter we will keep getting better and effectively demonstrate that the Department of the Air Force civil engineers are lethal and ready."
